- 7. To develop extra-linguistic competences that enable the student to participate in academic and professional environments


Learning outcomes

Course description

The main aim of the course is to facilitate the students' communication in the English-speaking academic environment (seminars, conferences, workshops, discussions, classes, correspondence, etc). The winter term is going to be focused on familiarizing the students with the formal register in writing as well as providing guidelines in effective writing such texts as cover letters, applications, reports, abstracts (including summaries of Bachelor and Master dissertations), scientific papers, as well as correspondence in the academic context. The summer term is going to be devoted to developing skills needed in public speaking in the academic environment, mainly conference presentations, poster sessions, debates and handling questions during discussions. The course may be of particular interest to those students who use English-language sources in their academic work, who are planning a study period or a scholarship/grant abroad or those who wish to follow an academic career in the future and want to communicate science effectively.



Course Content

Topics and vocabulary related to the following topic areas:

- 1. The formal register and the features of Academic English
- 2. Models of selected academic genres
- 3. Paragraph writing, cohesion and coherence
- 4. Passive voice and reported speech
- 5. General academic vocabulary
- 6. Hedging, precision and objectivity
- 7. Summarising, paraphrasing, quoting, quotation stylesheets
- 8. Academic correspondence and social interaction
- 9. Analysis of selected course-related lectures and presentations
- 10. Analysis of selected course-related academic papers
- 11. Creating academic and professional texts, e.g. professional e-mail, abstract, description of visual data, report, scientific paper
- 12. Delivering an academic presentation and taking part in discussions
- 13. Preparing for the recruitment process (for employment, internship or grant)
- 14. (Optionally) selected grammar issues related to the course content

Additional information

1. Teaching methods

Workshop, group discussion, case studies, solving problems, mini presentations, e-learning.

2. Forms of obtaining ECTS


1st semester: writing tasks (detailed instructions will be provided in due course), a written test in topics covered during the semester

2nd semester: delivering a 10-minute presentation (plus 10 minutes for discussion) in a miniconference session related to the course, a written test in topics covered during the semester

Final written and spoken examination after 2 semesters (60 hours) of the course (detailed information on the form of the examination are specified in the description available at https://jcj.uj.edu.pl/egzaminy/egzamin-konczacy-lektorat

3. Conditions of obtaining ECTS

Completing all tests as well as written and spoken assignments with a score of at least 60% of the maximum number of points per semester.



Regular attendance. Without an appropriate justification, the student may miss no more than two 90-minute classes per semester if the course covers 30 hours per semester.

Passing the final written examination with a score of at least 60% of the maximum number of points. Passing the spoken examination.

4. Entry requirements

It is assumed that the Participants entering this course already know the lexis and grammar issues at C1 level, according to the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages, as well as possess the appropriate skills to communicate successfully in speech and writing in everyday situations and the academic context at C1 level.


