

The Jagiellonian Language Centre's *Zeszyty Glottodydaktyczne* is a forum for the exchange of teaching experiences on the part of Jagiellonian Language Centre teachers. The articles published in the journal are related to foreign language teaching.

## 1. General principles

- 1.1. The article should be written in Polish or English.
- 1.2. The article should contain an abstract and key words in Polish and English.
- 1.3. The article should be written in Times New Roman 12 font, 1.5 interline spacing.
- 1.4. Text organization:
  - name and surname of the author;
  - title in the Polish and English version; if the text is in Polish - first in Polish, if the text is in English - first in English;
  - abstract and key words – as with the title - if the text is in Polish - first in Polish, if the text is in English - first in English;
  - the text of the article with footnotes;
  - bibliography;
  - additional materials (e.g. exercises for students, keys to exercises, materials for teachers)
- 1.5. The principles for writing a bibliography can be found in a paper version at the Jagiellonian Language Centre Office.
- 1.6. The text in an electronic version should be submitted to the Editorial Office of the Jagiellonian Language Centre's *Zeszyty Glottodydaktyczne* (2 Krupnicza Street, Room 105) or sent to: [irena.polanska@uj.edu.pl](mailto:irena.polanska@uj.edu.pl).

## 2. Rules for in-text citing

- 2.1. Texts or fragments of texts used in the content of the article covered by the right of quotation should be provided with the relevant source information (rules regarding printed texts are included in the rules for providing sources in the bibliography; on-line sources should be given by providing a link with the date of access).
- 2.2. In addition to the excerpts from the texts covered by the principle of the right of quotation, any text used may be printed only on the condition that the consent of the copyright holder is obtained.
- 2.3. The Creative Commons license operates in accordance with the "certain rights reserved" principle, which does not entitle other authors to place texts or fragments of them in other publications.  
Texts from on-line resources proposed for use as additional materials should be provided with links.
- 2.4. Texts from Wikipedia are not subject to copyright and can be used by providing a link and the date of access.
- 2.5. The above rules also apply to the printing of photographs, illustrations, etc.
